Our good colleagues in Minnesota have shared a newsletter that constitutes a powerful, succinct, well substantiated overview of the state of our field. We commend this to your attention with the assurance that you will be motivated to heighten your commitment to the important infant mental health work.

"Early Childhood Mental Health Services: Four State Case Studies," is another important publication. Published by U.S. Department of Special Education, two of the states described are Connecticut and Michigan. Our Early Childhood Consultation Partnership program is described. And Michigan's endorsement process is described to illustrate professional development in the field.

This in-depth policy analysis provides a background of the early childhood mental health (ECMH) focus of many organizations and legal elements of why it

is essential that children with disabilities be included in a comprehensive mental health system. Findings from interviews with four state early childhood staff (i.e., the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, Part B section 619 and Part C staff) were conducted around select components of mental health: Connecticut - consultation; Michigan preparation and professional development; Ohio – partnerships; and Illinois – finance. Findings include that a variety of staff at a mental health agency and staff for Part B, Section 619 and Part C, share responsibilities related to ECMH.

Data is also collected through a statewide ECMH partnership and some individual programs; however none of the states have developed a uniform or coordinated data system for ECMH. All states indicated a need for changes in Medicaid policy to accept coding from the Diagnostic Classification of Mental Health and Developmental Disorders.

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CT-IAMH Competencies Lead to Endorsement

e have nine people ready to work with our colleagues in Michigan toward the Endorsement for Culturally Sensitive, Relationship-Focused Practice Promoting Infant Mental Health®.

This endorsement team will be trained to serve as reviewers and mentors for the next group of Connecticut endorsement seekers. During this past year, the Competency Planning Consortium has worked diligently to promote the competencies.

League of States

The states that are offering endorsements in infant mental health following the Michigan process and make up the League of States are: Arizona, New Mexico, Idaho, Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Virginia and Connecticut.

The League meeting in Dallas in December 2009, was an opportunity to discuss with other states how they provide and fund reflective supervision for people working to promote infant/early childhood mental health, mentors and supervisors. Individual and group reflective supervision was demonstrated.

Baby Caucus

Rep Denny Rehberg (MT) have initiated a Baby Caucus in Washington DC. The Congressional Baby Caucus aims to ensure that public policy reflects the latest research in understanding how children's brains are shaped and developed, how positive behaviors can be encouraged, and how investments in early childhood create success in later years, as well as that families are supported with what they need to take advantage of the scientific advances.

CT-AIMH members met with Rep.
DeLauro in July to share with her what
Connecticut is doing to promote
infant/toddler mental health in CT. A
paper we shared with her was
enhanced by **Janice Gruendel** who
presented Connecticut infant/toddler
work at the second Baby Caucus this
fall. That paper is included on the next
page of this newsletter.



Connecticut Initiatives That Focus on Infants and Toddlers¹

Policy/Planning Initiatives

- The CT Association for Infant Mental Health's is developing a strategic plan for promoting infant/toddler mental health (now in draft form).
- First Words, First Steps², a strategic plan for serving infants and toddlers in CT, was adopted by the CT Early Childhood Education Cabinet in early 2009. This report is a part of the Connecticut Ready by Five, Fine by Nine Early Childhood Systems Framework,³ adopted by the Cabinet in June 2006.
- A Frame Work for Child Health Services⁴ was adopted by the Early Childhood Education Cabinet in 2009 and published by the Child Health and Development Institute of CT.⁵
- Promoting Early Health and Learning: A Profile of Two Connecticut Communities (February 2009) published by the Child Health and Development Institute of CT.⁶

Workforce Development Initiatives

- CT Association for Infant Mental Health (CT-AIMH) is promoting its *Competency Guidelines and Endorsement* for Culturally Sensitive, Relationship-Focused Practice that Promote Infant Mental Health®. Endorsement plans are in process.⁷
- The *Certificate in Infant/Toddler Care* through Charter Oak State College is for infant/toddler caregivers with a high school diploma. The *CT Early Childhood Teacher Credential* with infant toddler endorsement is to ensure teachers have the competencies required to teach our youngest children.
- Early Childhood Consultant training includes "Infant Toddler Modules" provided by the CT Head Start Collaboration Office and the National Infant & Toddler Child Care Initiative (Zero to Three) with additional support from Region 1 Child Care and Healthy Child Care New England.⁸
- A workforce initiative through Building Blocks, a SAMHSA funded initiative of the Southeast Mental Health System of Care (SEMSOC). This is the only SAMHSA funded Early Childhood System of Care that has a workforce initiative.⁹

Service Delivery Initiatives

- CT Guidelines for the Development of Infant & Toddler Early Learning to reach, inform and support infant toddler primary caregivers.¹⁰
- CT Birth to Three System Guideline #9: Serving Children and Families in Child Care Settings (in process). 11
- The CT *Child FIRST*¹² initiative has just received a \$3.195 million grant from the Robert Wood Johnson foundation to replicate in at least four additional communities.
- Help Me Grow through Child Development Infoline mails Ages & Stages questionnaires to families for monitoring infant/toddler development.¹³
- The Nurturing Family Network provides home visits to first time parents at risk for harmful parenting. 14
